I would like to **thank all the members** who have helped me support ORA.

**As part of our continued efforts**, ORA has partnered with the Association of Children's Prosthetics and Orthotic clinics (ACPOC), a society older than ours. It is an organization devoted to children with physical disabilities. It's membership is multi-disciplinary. Orthopaedic surgeons are supported by Pediatricians, Neurologists, and PM&R. ACPOC also has a very strong allied health membership and all are knowledgeable about the needs of the handicapped child and efforts made to improve function and mobility. The ORA21 meeting with ACPOC further demonstrated the strong similarities in the goals and values of the two organizations.

PLEASE PLAN TO COME TO THE **JOINT MEETING. PARK CITY, UTAH** March 30 – April 2. at the Canyons Resort. In addition to the fabulous skiing, the town of Park City, well-known for hosting the Sundance Film Festival, has a wide range of activities.

**The program committee** is currently working to provide you with an interesting and informative meeting. They are particularly interested in the following specific topics for symposia and instructional course development: spinal orthoses, orthoses used with limb lengthening, tibial deficiency: salvage vs. amputation, clubfoot orthoses, limb salvage in the treatment of malignant tumors, and orthotic use in arthrogryposis. Surgical presentations require a review of appropriate imaging studies for proper planning and execution. All presenters are strongly encouraged to include not only clinical photos but also radiographs in their presentations.

The **Vernon Nickel** paper will be presented and ORA will attempt to add two symposia plus an update from the Military Orthopaedists concerning the rehabilitation of the severely injured and limb-loss soldier. There will also be an invited guest speaker distinguished in orthopaedic rehabilitation. Check the website for program updates (**OrthoRehabAssoc.org**)

**Formed in 1989**, ORA is at a 'crossroads' as we are now one generation old. Many of our founding members have retired and are no longer practicing. We need younger members with understanding and love for children and adults with disabilities, able to see the potential of rehabilitation and long-term care including appropriate surgical solutions. ACPOC is facing a similar problem. A merger appears quite likely and your opinion is desired. It would allow ORA to have 'younger' blood and to be more diversified.
